

# B. Gem Mining

More than 40 gem-mining attractions dot North Carolina, inviting treasure hunters to discover gold, rubies, sapphires, garnets, quartz, aquamarines and other colorful semi-precious stones. Learn to operate a mining sluice, grab a shovel and dig, or go creekin' by wading into streams and poking under rocks, looking for shiny finds. Only one – Emerald Hollow Mine in Hiddenite – offers the tantalizing prospect of finding emeralds, as it's the only place in the United States where you can mine for these green gemstones.

Children and grown-ups alike will be thrilled with their gemstone finds!

## c. Wakeboarding on Lake Gaston

You don't have to be an International Waterski & Wakeboard Foundation champion to enjoy wakeboarding – a combination of waterskiing, surfing and snowboarding – although you'll find one on Lake Gaston, near Roanoke Rapids and Warrenton. If you enjoy fast times on the water, this 20,000-acre lake provides excellent opportunities to stay on the water or go airborne. If you prefer slower life on the lake, enjoy fishing for bass or catfish, or just relax along the shore on an inner tube or swimming.



## D. Tryon International Equestrian Center

This state-of-the-art center features five riding arenas to showcase top dressage, hunter and other notable equestrian events. Elevated viewing platforms with climate-controlled shade structures mean you'll see all the competition action in comfort. The Tryon International Equestrian Center is part of a 1,400-acre development with plans for a hotel, full luxury resort and spa, golf, bridle and hiking paths, and more.

# E. Singletree Gun & Plough

This small rustic hideaway sets the stage for big outdoor adventures in the Piedmont. Singletree features a seven-bedroom lodge and four smaller cabins on 1,000 wooded acres, including 5 miles of riverfront. Adjacent to Hanging Rock State Park in Westfield, Singletree encourages guests to rise before dawn for fly-fishing on the Dan River or turkey and deer hunting on largely undisturbed property. Days here bring horseback riding, kayaking, hiking, swimming, ziplining and watching glorious sunsets beyond cliff-rimmed Hanging Rock and the Blue Ridge Mountains.

# F. Paddling & Lamping

Whether for a leisurely afternoon or ambitious weekends, kayakers and canoeists dip paddles in a variety of waters across the state, from saltwater marshes and sounds to freshwater lakes to whitewater rapids. Camping platforms, such as those at Holladay's Island near Edenton, involve paddling to raised 16-by-24-foot decks. Some of the campsites at Lake James State Park near Nebo are accessible only by water. Once at these sites, all that's left is to pitch your tent, hang a lantern, cook out, stargaze and relax amid the stunning landscape.

# н. Rock Climbing & Rappelling

An abundance of quartzite cliffs and exposed granite provides countless climbing opportunities. There's bouldering (without ropes) at Hound Ears, friction climbing (using special shoes on steep slopes) at Stone Mountain, free (with ropes, in case of falls) and aid (using attached devices) climbing at Looking Glass Rock, rappelling (descending on a fixed rope) at Chimney Rock, ice climbing on frozen waterfalls around Brevard, and more. Indoor gyms bring the thrill to cities and flatlands, too.

# 1. Jockey's Ridge State Park

Steady winds off the ocean pile sand onto Jockey's Ridge, the tallest dune system in the eastern United States. Located on the Outer Banks, this state park is a great place to fly kites, scan the Atlantic Ocean and Roanoke Sound on opposite sides, and run down the constantly replenished sand slopes. In the spirit of the Wright Brothers, who famously experimented with manned flight nearby, hang gliding and hiking are popular at Jockey's Ridge, too.
